Amateur Sports Events

\$75,000

Club soccer tournaments are a fun and popular activity for children of all ages. During one particularly competitive game, a 16-year-old sprints after a wild kick and runs into an 8-year-old on an adjacent field. Both players suffer moderate injuries, and both families claim the fields were too close together with no preventative measures in place. The younger player's family settles for ticket and tournament fee reimbursements, while the older player's family hires an attorney and demands \$75,000 as reimbursement for medical bills, pain and suffering and the loss of a college scholarship. GL: Fall - claimant alleges she was walking on the bleachers and fell, catching her leg. She states she had to have surgery as she tore a ligament in her knee. Result was a paid claim. The claimant just took a wrong step as there was no problem with the bleachers.
